2013 LUSH AWARD – JOHN DYKES

The MOTAT Society introduced the Lush Family Award just over twenty years ago. It was named in memory of the Auckland pioneer family with strong links to the MOTAT collection and to the Society. The award is made in recognition of the dedication and effort of a volunteer worker in their service to the Museum and especially for behind the scenes tasks willingly undertaken that enhance a section's activities.

At the 2013 AGM, this year's Lush Award was presented to John Dykes. To give you a better picture of John's contributions here is an excerpt from his nomination from Aviation.



John Dykes became a MOTAT volunteer seven years ago, bringing his various marine, aviation and general engineering background skills and knowledge to our benefit. He has been a huge asset to the Museum particularly in the solving of difficult and complex problems. His enthusiasm for the Museum artefacts has greatly benefitted our interactive displays.

There are a number of working examples of John's valuable input into the aviation display, the outstanding one being the suspension and mobilization of the flight control surfaces, undercarriage flaps and external lighting of the Harvard aircraft. To achieve this it was necessary for John to remove the hydraulic system, then redesign the control functions and movement using electric rams. This meant that the Harvard needed to be rewired to allow all functions to be

remotely controlled from a mock cockpit which he also designed and built. Hundreds of hours of John's home time were spent on this process working in his own workshop to design and fabricate many one off items and to build the electrical control system required to operate the Harvard.

John continues to work with us in the Aviation Section on general and specific projects where re-fabrication is required. Each week he takes an item requiring a rebuild or remodel to his home workshop returning it the following week repaired and ready for fitting. There are several other examples of the work that John has completed within the Aviation Display Hall.

John's willingness over several years to work his full volunteer day and then take "homework" home each week ensuring and enabling many aviation projects to progress at a rate far greater than they otherwise could has proved invaluable to MOTAT during his many years of service.

John remains positive and supportive with all who work with him and continues to solve many re-creative problems with our artefacts. He remains an example to us all with his "Can Do" attitude and will, I am sure, continue to encourage s to do the same. I have pleasure in recommending John Dykes as a worthy recipient of the 2013 Lush Award for services to MOTAT.



2013 LIFE MEMBERS Profiles:

MURRAY LANE:



Murray Lane joined MOTAT as a volunteer in 1968 and restored the Pobjoy 'Niagara' radial aero engine and then started work on the heap of tubes at the back of the John Logan building, which was the start of a solo effort in producing the only remaining Vickers Vildebeest aeroplane in the world. This Vildebeest is one of the major restoration projects at the RNZAF museum at Wigram. Murray left MOTAT in 1974.

In 2005 Murray returned to MOTAT and started work with the steam section team on the restoration of the Western Springs beam engine pump which was put back into steam in early 2008. He also researched the history of Auckland's water supply and the beam engine, which was included in the book 'The Beam Engine and Western Springs Pumping Station'. Since then he has been at MOTAT 2 developing the Engineering workshop and restoring workshop machines and other Steam section artifacts to a very high standard.

Murray works away quietly and mostly unseen putting in far greater hours than are expected of a volunteer and over the 15+ years has made a large contribution to MOTAT.

LEYTON CHAN:

Leyton joined as a volunteer in the tramway section of MOTAT in June 2004 and is currently serving his tenth year at the museum.



It was the day after the funeral of the late Dr Bruce Gamble, (former tramway manager, society committee member, Board member, engineer and tram restorer) that Albert Chan approached me to see how we would manage after losing such a powerhouse and craftsman. He mentioned that his son was an engineer, woodworker and a very good varnisher so I asked him to bring Leyton along the following Sunday.

Leyton has helped in the restoration of Auckland tram No.44 and Wellington Double-Decker tram No.47 and at present is project manager of the dismantled remains of Wanganui tram-trailer No.21's rebuild to be towed by the Steam tram motor No.100 which will add a very interesting travelling experience for the visitors to the museum. This project has required CAD drawings and much research by Leyton which also included a visit to Ferrymead, Christchurch to study the rather peculiar design by the trailer's maker Boon & Co. using other trams from this builder at their museum as examples. This restoration project is well underway with a dedicated team of volunteers learning the 'trade' literally from the ground up!

During 2012, Leyton was appointed Acting Section Manager in the absence of Colin Zeff whilst he was on leave and lifted the standards in the communication to the volunteers and activities and news within the tramways to a new level. Leyton is currently serving on the MOTAT Society as Tramway representative and Acting Chair.

Leyton goes well beyond the responsibility of volunteering and has helped myself with research of the former Auckland trams serving as baches and providing owners with historical information and service dates.

He is also a qualified tram driver and driver trainer for Auckland tram No.44. The improvement and more professional tram uniforms were instigated by Leyton with the manufacturing of hats and replica tram jackets which also required many hours of research.

Such a devotion to duty makes Leyton a deserving recipient of a life membership award from not only

myself but his fellow volunteers also.

BILL RAYNER:

Few have been as devoted to the museum as Bill Rayner who has been involved with MOTAT for over twenty five years. He joined the original



MOTAT aviation section at a time when it was a fledgling unit overstretched on projects with many volunteers but few experienced organisers. Bill's background of accounting and years of political and corporate experience has been invaluable for the on-going development of MOTAT.

Bill has always been a regular attender over his twenty plus years of volunteering and has served many years as a Board member. He worked hard during the creation of the MOTAT Act 2000 to ensure that the Society had on-going representation on the MOTAT board.

On stepping down from the Board, Bill was elected to the Society committee where he has acted at times as chair, secretary and treasurer. He is also a regular contributor of articles for the Driving Wheel magazine.

Throughout the years he has assisted and advised members of the committee, the Board and local government on museum matters, protocol and accounting. He has been and continues to be a very great asset to MOTAT.



Member of the MOTAT Society since 2011. Natural history illustrator (c. 1976-81). Studied Design at Carrington Technical Institute / UNITEC—*Diploma in Design* (1982), *Certificate in Design Management* (1985), *Master of Design Management* (2005). Professional Member of the Designers Institute of New Zealand and Member of the Royal Society of New Zealand.

Industrial design consultant—product, interiors, exhibitions, graphics, illustration and design management. Tutored Design at Carrington Technical Institute (1984-86), Christchurch Polytechnic (1997) and Whitecliffe College (2000). Designer for the MOTAT Body Tech exhibit (1990),

and the New Zealand Pavilion, Expo 88, Brisbane, Queensland (1987-88). Attended and addressed international design conferences in China, from 1996-2005. Appointed a judge for the CCTV Creativity and Design Awards, 2006 China Industrial Design Week & Wuxi International Industrial Design Expo.

Served with the Auckland Museum Institute, Learned Society and Programme Committee and the Council (2000-09), Onehunga Main Street Committee (1990s); and the Northern Region Committee of the New Zealand Society of Industrial Designers (1986).

Philip researches early New Zealand aviation pioneers, contributing to Richard Pearse flying-machine projects since 1977, including MOTAT's Centenary of Flight project (2003). He also researches the Royal Engineers and their works in New Zealand in the 1840s.

Kim Heppner – Road transport rep

As the newly appointed Road Transport Section representative on the Society committee I hope to be able to help in returning MOTAT to being a “live” museum once again.

Much of Bill's MOTAT history is covered in his life membership nomination on page 4. Bill was first involved in MOTAT in the 1960's through his father-in-law, John Malcolm, a retired NAC pilot who was involved in establishing MOTAT, and its early management.

Bill had a career in international shipping and aviation as a senior finance executive, and has been an active heritage activist in Auckland for many years. He was appointed to the initial MOTAT Board in 2000, was Aviation Curator for two years.

Among his heritage/museum activities he has been a member of the Auckland Museum Institute Council,

Te Papa National Services Sector Standards Panel, an advisor to the Ministry of Arts, Culture and Heritage on the review of the Antiquities Act, a Board member for two years of the International Association of Transport Museums of Copenhagen, and is a member of the Auckland Council Heritage Advisory Board.

He has a strong interest and involvement with the small community museums sector and is interested and active in the local and national political environment promoting heritage issues.

John Syme – Steam rep

John has an extensive background with MOTAT having been appointed initially to the MOTAT Board in 2000 following the passing of the MOTAT Act. Subsequently he had 2 year contract as Director specifically to achieve the first Strategic Vision and Plan.



2014 Society Events


At the end of October Committee meeting, new committee member Frances Young volunteered to be our new Event Coordinator.

MOTAT Board 2013 Appointments

A core responsibility of the MOTAT Society under the MOTAT Act 2000 is the appointment of four members to the MOTAT Board (the Museum's governing body), with the council appointing the other six via the RFA – Regional Facilities Auckland. Usually the appointments are for two years, with five of the ten positions coming up for reappointment each year. However this year due to some extra-ordinary vacancies it became necessary for the appointment of 8 new Board members.

This year the Society's Board Appointment subcommittee consisted of Leyton Chan, Lyndsay Whittle and Henry Swan. The Society subcommittee worked with representatives of the RFA, with the aid of Kevin McCaffrey as facilitator, to call for applicants and carry out the selection process. To minimise the "contingency representation" effect it was decided that incoming Board members will not be informed who appointed them (RFA or Society).

The appointees were recommended by the Society's Board Appointment subcommittee to the Society committee and approved confidentially in late July.

As mentioned in Leyton's welcome, the 8 new Board members joining Nicholas Taylor and Lindsay Corban are: James Douglas; Bruce Howat; Richard Jeffery; John McElhinney; Dr Lesley McTurk; Mike Spraggon, Hon. Judith Tizard and Vern Walsh

The Society welcomes the new board and also gives thanks to the outgoing Board members Grant Kirby, Claudette Hauiti, John Syme, Chris Chitty, Tom O'Connor and Ross Sharp for their contributions to the Museum.

The first public meeting of the new MOTAT Board was held on the 24th October, with Dr Lesley McTurk appointed as Chair and Nicholas Taylor appointed as Deputy.

For your interest, we asked the new Board members to provide short profiles, with those received to date on the following pages.

Introducing the new MOTAT BOARD

Dr Lesley McTurk, Chair

As an Aucklander I have been visiting MOTAT for three generations - as a child myself, with my own daughter and now my three granddaughters love to come with me, especially to the holiday programmes.

I have joined the board along with a number of other new members. Through our induction we have been well briefed on the history of the Museum and the MOTAT Society. We look forward to working as a board, and with the Chief Executive, to determine a strategic direction for MOTAT that will ensure it is here and relevant for our great-grandchildren too.

My own background is leadership roles in a number of different sectors and I have been on various boards. Currently I am on the Priory Trust Board of St John, another organisation with a strong volunteer force. Until last year I was Chief Executive of Housing New Zealand Corporation and before that, Christchurch City Council. My doctorate is in medical ethics, from Glasgow University, and I worked in the health sector for many years.

Antarctica is a particular passion of mine and I served for six years as an independent trustee on the Antarctic Heritage Trust. Its Ross Sea Heritage Restoration Project conserves the huts left in Antarctica by early explorers of the heroic era (1895 - 1917). The work of the Trust protects the legacy of leaders like Sir Ernest Shackleton and Captain Robert Falcon Scott, so the values of discovery, adventure and endurance continue to inspire current and future generations. The Trust collaborates with the Natural History Museum, London and Canterbury Museum in Christchurch, to profile strong links to Antarctic exploration and science.

Last Christmas I went to Antarctica for the third time. A group of us camped in tents on the ice to do field work, as part of a university course in Antarctic Studies. The heroic era of exploration was the focus of my dissertation, and the way the spirit of adventure, values and leadership qualities still inspire us today.

To fully appreciate the present, and prepare for the future, we must understand how we got here – through our past. MOTAT helps our community do this. There is a great saying in Maori that we walk backwards into the future; in other words, looking to those who went before us and honouring them and their achievements, while we make progress and move forward.

It is good to be back home and living in Auckland, after a decade away in Christchurch and Wellington. I look forward to being involved in MOTAT's future.

Nicholas Taylor, BA, LL.B, Deputy Chair

My background is in history and archaeology. After graduating I worked as a professional archeologist for a time before undertaking law.

I am currently a Barrister and have been for the last 16 years.

I have active interests in model and mechanical engineering, steam engines, boat building, jewellery making, damascus knife making, vintage car and motorcycle restorations, antique firearms restoration, vintage radios and an interest in vintage and warbird aircraft. I am a volunteer in the steam section at MOTAT.

This is my third year on the MOTAT board of directors.



Lindsay Corban MA Hons

Lindsay has served on the boards of a range of companies and community organisations. As a Mt Albert resident Lindsay often brings her grandchildren to MOTAT. She has a lifelong interest in heritage and conservation particularly in relation to old houses and memorabilia.

James Douglas

As an Aucklander born and bred, he has spent numerous hours enjoying MOTAT and he can fondly recall as an 8 year old seeing the Lancaster with three engines running and the fantastic noise it made. James would love to see MOTAT considered to be one of the must-see Museums in New Zealand and one which both adults and children come away enthralled by their experience.

James has 18 years experience in the Trust and Financial Services industry, most recently as Tower Insurance's Chief Executive Officer for 4 years.
