## Full Day Outing To THE KAURI MUSEUM, MATAKOHE

## Saturday 22nd FEBRUARY 2014

We are currently planning for a full day Society outing to The Kauri Museum at Matakohe, on 22 February next year, so pencil the date in your diaries. Full details to follow in the next Squeaky Wheel newsletter / emails late January. Matakohe is about two hours drive north of Auckland.

The Kauri Museum and MOTAT have a special connection and in light of MOTAT's 50<sup>th</sup> celebrations next year it seems an ideal opportunity to remember that connection. Both museums have their roots in *The Old Time Transport Preservation League* which was established in 1957 (becoming incorporated in Jan 1958). The League was formed when initial aims to preserve some of the Auckland Trams (after the tramways closed in 1956) extended to the idea of the creation of a museum to preserve all forms of transport. Mervyn Sterling offered 6 acres of land at Matakohe which became the initial site, but it soon became apparent this was not the ideal location for a large scale Transport Museum which would be better suited to a metropolitan area.

At the same time the Royal Aeronautical Society's Auckland Branch was endeavouring to establish a technology museum at the Western Springs Pumping station. They worked with the League and The Historic Auckland Society, supported by many other heritage and enthusiast groups, to present a plan to Council in 1960 for a NZ Transport, Aeronautical and Technological Museum at Western Springs. The MOTAT Society was born, and after much work the Museum opened in 1964. The Matakohe collection was mostly transferred to MOTAT and the League wound up 1963.

However the experience inspired those at Matakohe to create a Pioneer Museum in 1962 with items held back, and this has developed over time to become The Kauri Museum, Matakohe. This internationally acclaimed Museum is one of the best places to visit in Northland, and provides a perfect insight into Northland's pioneer past. Check out their website:
